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VIA Names Tremell Brown Deputy Chief Executive Officer



VIA Metropolitan Transit has named one of its own to its No. 2 leadership position, selecting Tremell Brown, a 33-year veteran of the agency, to serve as Deputy CEO.

Brown began his career at VIA in 1990 as a part-time bus operator. He advanced through the Operations Division, having held several leadership positions, including Vice President of Transportation, VP of Safety, Training and System Security and Chief Safety Officer.

As Deputy CEO, Brown will assist VIA's President/CEO in oversight of all staff functions and agency operations. He will also directly manage key operating divisions, including Transportation, Maintenance/Fleet and Facilities, Fiscal Management, Human Resources, Technology and Innovation, Safety, Training and System Security (STSS), and Procurement.

"During his tenure at VIA, Tremell has served with distinction and accumulated invaluable experience across

the agency," President/CEO Jeffrey C. Arndt said. "Just as importantly, he's built meaningful relationships with people across every department. I'm confident that with his service-minded approach, he'll continue to lean in and push VIA to do great things for our community."

Brown will continue to serve as Chief Safety Officer and lead VIA's STSS division, where he helped develop, implement, and oversee law enforcement, safety, and training development, and was installed as the agency's Incident Commander for Emergency Management.

Born in Sacramento, California, Brown was raised in a military family and moved to San Antonio when his father was stationed at Lackland Air Force Base. He attended schools in the Northside Independent School District and joined VIA at age 21. He has dedicated his life and career to supporting the agency's mission to connect our community.

"An advantage I see in this role as Deputy CEO is actually that I get a chance to do more of something I enjoy, and that's just managing relationships, closing the gaps, addressing the issues," Brown said. "I'll get to work across the organization to fix issues and challenges. I'm always interested in developing better understanding and I get a chance now to get out there and connect more with the people who are closer to the solutions."

Brown is an active community volunteer and advocate for causes that support diversity, equity, and inclusion. He is a Rutgers University National Transit Institute Fellow, an FBI Citizen Academy Alumnus, a Leadership American Public Transportation Association (APTA) Class of 2016 graduate and a 2012 NAACP Entrepreneurship Honoree in San Antonio. He studied Organizational Development at University of The Incarnate Word and is NIMS/ICS certified in Emergency Management/ Response and has served in various leadership capacities over Operations, Law Enforcement, Safety, Training, and others. 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SWART Forms a Non-Profit to Support Mobility Initiatives

The Southwest Area Regional Transit District (SWART) announces the formation of the non-profit organization, Partners In Transit, Inc. which will support mobility initiatives in the Middle Rio Grande Region. The newly formed organization will be a separate entity of SWART and will operate as an educational and charitable organization in support of addressing mobility challenges and public transportation services.



Enhancing Mobility for All

As stated in its Summary of Purpose outlined in its legal filing with the Texas Secretary of State, Partners In Transit will operate in the follow-

ing manner: "Allowing our rural communities to have access to mobility solutions such as public transportation will provide residents the freedom to go anywhere they choose thus, enhancing their quality of life. In addition, public transportation is an economic driver that impacts the Middle Rio Grande Region by providing access and support to retail, employment, health care, higher education, tourism, and socialization. <u>Partners In Transit, Inc.</u> is being established as a non-profit entity to enhance transportation services within the Middle Rio Grande Region, especially those with special needs who depend on public transit as their lifeline to their community. Partners in Transit, Inc. will raise funds through grant awards and donations. Funds raised will be used to assist the transit stakeholders create new programs, fund unique transportation services providers are more than the buses they operate. They have a level of care and concern for those who use the services, and as SWART has experienced, we create a safe, reliable, and affordable transportation alternative to enhance mobility. Partners In Transit, Inc. needs to ensure this type of transit service is maintained and enhanced as we move into the next phase of serving the rapidly growing population of Southwest Texas."

The mission is to support mobility solutions for all through the promotion of collaboration, advocacy, and education. The vision is to provide mobility self-sufficiency to residents of the Middle Rio Grande Region of Texas while supporting & enhancing community development and economic development.

According to SWART's General Manager, Sarah Hidalgo-Cook, who will also serve as the Executive Director for Partners In Transit, Inc., "we have been working on the formation of the non-profit for almost a year with the blessing of our board of directors. SWART is a local government, and we will be the first standalone rural transit district in Texas to form a non-profit to support mobility, although there are others across the nation who have done so very successfully. We are beginning to see other rural transit districts following our lead. We are excited with the opportunities it will create for the region by being able to tap into alternative funding resources, generate matching funds to support public transit, and to enhance mobility management initiatives. ". Cynthia Rodriguez, SWART's Assistant General Manager, will serve as the Deputy Director, while the SWART Board of Directors will also serve as the governing board of the non-profit organization. The board members include Judge Bella Rubio (Real County), Judge Souli Shanklin (Edwards County), Judge John Paul Schuster (Kinney County), Judge Bill Mitchell (Uvalde County), Judge Cynthia Martinez-Rivera (Zavala County), Judge Leodoro Martinez III (La Salle County), Judge Martha Alicia Ponce, (Dimmit County), and Judge Ramsey English-Cantu (Maverick County).

VIA Opens First Community Office Focused on Keep SA Moving Project; Advanced Rapid Transit Project Office to serve as resource for future 'Green Line'

SAN ANTONIO (June 28, 2023) – As VIA Metropolitan Transit continues to move forward to deliver the city's first Advanced Rapid Transit corridor, local officials on Wednesday celebrated the opening of a Project Office designed to be an information hub for the community.

President/CEO Jeff Arndt was joined by Mayor Ron Nirenberg, former Mayor and U.S. Housing Secretary Henry Cisneros and VIA Board Chair Fernando Reyes at the project office to celebrate its opening. Though phased construction on the corridor isn't set to begin until 2025, the office opened as a community resource, offering the opportunity to meet with project team members, give feedback and get updates about the transformative transit project.

The celebration comes on the heels of action by the City Council and VIA Board of Trustees, approving two Interlocal Agreements (ILAs) that solidify the partnership between the two entities on moving the Advanced Rapid Transit North-South Corridor to an anticipated completion in 2027.

Known as the "VIA Rapid Green Line," the corridor runs from near the San Antonio International Airport along San Pedro Avenue, through Downtown and onto Steves Avenue, near Mission Concepcion. VIA Rapid is a new type of mass transit in San Antonio that generally runs in dedicated lanes, outside of regular traffic, and includes elements designed to reduce trip time. That includes off-board fare collection, level platform boarding and transit-priority traffic signals that will keep the Green Line running even during periods of peak traffic and congestion.

Advanced Rapid Transit is a key element in VIA's **Keep SA Moving** plan that voters approved in 2020. The Project Office reflects VIA's ongoing efforts to keep the public informed and engaged about the project, which is designed to move more people faster and farther, and connect them to more opportunities for education, employment, goods and resources. Project resources will include digital and print information and updates, as well as staff members available to respond to questions and comments.

More information

The initial planned ART corridor is the first of its kind in the region. The line will have connecting service on the north from Stone Oak Park & Ride and connecting service on the south end of the corridor to the Brooks Transit Center. The service is designed to improve transportation options for the nearly 54,000 residents and 108,000 jobs located within the 12-mile corridor.



VIA's Advanced Rapid Transit project, the planned "VIA Rapid" service, will be supported with federal funding, approved by Congress in 2022. It was the only Texas project added to President Biden's funding recommendation list for Fiscal Year 2023. It marks the first time San Antonio and VIA have been able to access this type of funding, which requires transit service that operates in dedicated lanes.

The ART Project Office will open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, and by appointment. Extended hours will be announced in the future. For more information or to request a meeting or presentation on the project, visit KeepSAmoving.com.
